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Introduction

In the fall of 2024, Ness County Health Department contracted with Wichita State University Community Engagement Institute (WSU CEI) to conduct a Community Health Needs Assessment and Community Health Improvement Plan for Ness County. WSU CEI's Center for Applied Research and Evaluation (CARE) conducted the data collection elements of the assessment, and the Center of Public Health Initiatives (CPHI) facilitated the community listening and planning sessions.

The Ness County Design Team was comprised of people from Ness County Health Department, Ness County Hospital, Ness County Public Health, Grisell Memorial Hospital, Ness County Emergency Medical Services, and representatives from the county.

Community Health Needs Assessment Summary

Demographics

Respondents to the community survey were similar in demographics to those that tend to respond across many other Community Health Needs Assessments that WSU CEI has conducted. Participants are primarily female, middle-aged to older, White, and mid- to high-income. While the survey sample of mostly White respondents is consistent with state and county populations, Hispanic/Latino/Spanish residents are underrepresented compared to state and county populations.

Notable Findings

The following section provides a summary of findings and highlights from the community survey responses and secondary data. The full results follow this section.

Top Needs

Ness County residents identified Housing, Aging-Related Issues, and Food/Nutrition to be of highest concern.

Housing

When compared to the state of Kansas, Ness County has significantly lower home values, median rent, significantly fewer renters spending over 30% of their income on rent and people with severe housing problems such as overcrowding, high housing costs, and lack of plumbing.

Homeowners were overrepresented in this survey sample – as 62.5% of Ness County are homeowners while 82.2% of respondents reported owning a home. Almost all participants reported having safe housing (95.1%) and most are satisfied with their current housing (89.8%).

Despite how secondary data portrays the housing landscape for Ness County, and that homeownership, housing safety, and housing satisfaction is high for survey participants, participants still repeatedly expressed housing as a concern throughout the survey.

Respondents identified housing as a top concern. Over half reported having high housing costs, 60.8% of respondents indicated they disagree or strongly disagree that their community has enough affordable housing and 61.4% indicated that affordable housing for everyone would improve their quality of life.

Regarding housing needs specifically, more than half of respondents reported affordable housing as a top concern, followed by more than one third that reported a lack of variety of affordable housing options (35.4%), and one third that reported assistance with property repair/maintenance as an issue (33.5%).

Participants who are renters most frequently indicated they did not own a home due to houses being too expensive to buy (53.3%), followed by there being a lack of availability of suitable housing to buy (46.7%).

Those who reported dissatisfaction with their current housing (N=24) most frequently indicated it was due to the place being too small (33.3%), followed by unsafe housing conditions (27.3%).

Community members who attended the community listening session elaborated on findings from the survey data. They described housing needs are related to a lack of available and affordable rentals; lack of available houses to buy; lack of safe housing for older adults/limited senior housing; lack of homes that are not outdated or in need of major repairs; difficulty finding housing to rent or own that has not had drug influence; and struggling with needing assistance with property repairs. Additionally, they explained there are regulation and policy barriers – the city not enforcing codes, there not being enough construction workers, and housing rules/policies that create barriers such as income requirements that disqualifies them due to their income being too high. Community members also explained that young people want to stay in the community, but the lack of affordable housing is a deterrent.

Economy

Secondary data indicate that, compared to Kansas overall, Ness County has fewer people over age 65 living below poverty, fewer households living below poverty, and fewer Asset Limited Income Constricted Employed (ALICE) households, which means the household lives above the poverty level but below the basic cost of living. Secondary data also indicate Ness County has more children under 18 and under 5 living below poverty than Kansas overall.

In this survey, households living below poverty level are underrepresented. Among survey participants, 4% reported an annual household income that falls below the federal poverty level of \$15,650, while there are twice as many Ness County households (8%) that live below poverty level.

Respondents were asked to rate statements about the quality of life in their community based on their experiences regarding the economy and housing. 45.4% disagreed or strongly disagreed that there are enough jobs in their community that pay a livable wage and 42.5% disagreed or strongly disagreed that people have enough opportunities and resources to succeed financially.

Aging-Related Issues

There is a higher percentage of people ages 65 and over in Ness County than Kansas (25.4% vs 17.5% respectively) and they are slightly overrepresented in the survey sample (27.7%). Survey respondents identified aging-related issues (caregiving, assisted living, services, safety) as a top concern. Respondent feelings on their community being accessible for older residents are mixed – 29.6% disagree or strongly disagree that their community has housing and support services available for older adults, while 35% agree or strongly agree.

There were relatively few survey questions that asked about aging-related issues, so participants had limited opportunity to elaborate on this concern. Additional research on this issue is recommended.

As reported above, community members during the community listening session mentioned housing being a concern for older adults. Specifically, they mentioned the lack of safe housing for older adults and limited senior housing. Other concerns about aging-related issues involve a lack of transportation to get around town and to healthcare; systematic barriers such as difficulties aging in home and affording home repairs, especially on a limited/fixed income; and other areas of accessibility such as food, adult day care, medical/health services.

Food

The food environment index ranges on a scale of 0 to 10 from worst to best, based on two indicators: 1) limited access to healthy food (population that are low-income and do not live close to a grocery store) and 2) food insecurity (population that has not had a reliable food source in the last year). While the index is higher for Ness County than it is for Kansas (8.2 vs 7.1 respectively), survey respondents still expressed concerns about food access. Participants identified food and nutrition (access to food stores, cost of food, healthy food options) as one of three top community needs. Over half disagree or strongly disagree that their community has an adequate number of grocery stores (52.7%) or has enough access to healthy and affordable food (55.5%). Respondents most commonly cited that access to affordable, healthy food would improve their quality of life (68%).

At the community listening session, community members described challenges around food being related to knowledge, accessibility, and finances. They explained that there needs to be more cooking classes and education about resources and food assistance. In terms of accessibility, they mentioned a lack of nutritious food available, there not being a farmers' market available due to a lack of space, transportation/distance to grocery stores being a barrier, and a lack of a grocery store in town. Regarding finances, they explained cost as a barrier since produce costs are high and those on a fixed income cannot afford healthy food.

Services

Survey participants most frequently identified Behavioral Health/Counseling Services (42.4%), Assisted Living Services (37.8%), Non-Emergency Medical Transportation Services (36.1%), and Ambulance Services (35.7%) as needed services.

Access

Participants indicated dental services were most difficult to access, while immunizations were easiest to access. Primary healthcare, and credible and accurate health information were also identified as easiest to access.

Cost is a significant barrier for Ness County residents seeking to receive healthcare services. Almost half of survey respondents identified cost as a barrier to receiving healthcare services. About a quarter identified the following barrier (location of healthcare services).

While there are fewer households without a vehicle in Ness County when compared to Kansas, a notable portion of survey respondents reported transportation as a barrier for their healthcare.

Children & Youth

Education and physical health are areas of lowest concern for children. When asked to select the top needs for children ages 0-12, 43% of participants identified childcare for children ages 0-5. Over a third identified bullying/relationship violence prevention and about a third identified employment opportunities as top needs for youth ages 13-18.

Mental Healthcare

Over a third of participants identified addressing stigma of people with mental health issues as the top need. Almost a third identified affordable mental health services, high quality mental health services, and affordable health insurance as top needs for mental healthcare. Over a fifth of respondents self-reported poor or fair mental health. Over two-thirds disagree or strongly disagree that their community has mental health services for people who need them.

Of 244 respondents, 41.8% of respondents reported not seeking mental healthcare or not experiencing barriers to mental healthcare. For the 142 respondents that do experience mental healthcare barriers, the most common barrier is the lack of mental health providers/services (62.7%), followed by discomfort with seeking mental health services/talking about personal issues (40.8%) and not being able to take time off work (31.7%).

Mental health being a top concern is supported by input from community members during the community listening session. They expressed concerns about access to providers and services, lack of mental health providers, stigma, knowledge/education on mental health issues, and substance use.

Dental Healthcare

Participants indicated dental services were most difficult to access. Respondents reported that the community does not meet many needs for children's dental health. Secondary data supports the survey results – there is a substantially lower dentist ratio for Ness County than for Kansas overall.

Community & Environment

Secondary data indicates the violent crime rate is substantially lower and there are fewer driving deaths involving alcohol in Ness County than in Kansas. There are substantially fewer

residents that live close to or have access to exercise opportunities (1.6% vs 79.9%) and parks (0% vs 47.5%) in Ness County compared to Kansas residents.

Participant satisfaction with their quality of life, local schools, healthcare system, and local government in the community is mixed. Participants' feelings about their emotional relationship/ties to the community and accessibility for disabled and older residents are also mixed. Though, most agree that their community is a safe place to live, and a good place to raise children, and grow old.

Needs by ZIP Code

The Design Team requested the data for these three questions be broken down by three groups of ZIP codes categorized according to differences in community contexts. One group includes Beeler and Ness (67518, 67560); another group includes Ransom, Utica, Arnold, & Brownell (67572, 67584, 67515, 67521); and another group includes Bazine (67516).

Regarding the top five community needs, housing and economy/employment show up across all three ZIP groups. Aging-related issues, youth/children related issues, and food/nutrition show up across two groups.

Regarding the top five mental health needs, addressing stigma and affordable health insurance that includes mental healthcare show up across all three ZIP groups. Affordable mental health services, children's mental health services, and high quality mental health services show up across two groups.

Regarding the top five housing needs, affordable housing, variety of affordable housing options, and assistance with property repair/maintenance show up across all three ZIP groups. Code enforcement and higher quality rentals show up across two groups.

Methodology

Secondary Data Collection

Secondary data is publicly available data that is typically collected at the census tract, zip code, town/city, county, state, or national level. Secondary data provides a broad perspective of community conditions but can be several years old due to the complexity of collection and analysis. It is often not available for smaller communities due to too few people reporting or experiencing certain conditions. The most well-known secondary data source is the United States Census. Kansas Health Matters (KHM) and County Health Rankings (CHR) were utilized as sources for secondary data – both of which compile data from numerous external sources.

Survey Methodology

The survey was designed by CARE and the Design Team in a collaborative process. After selection of questions, the online survey was programmed into the Alchemer platform. The survey was also available to take on paper. Both were offered in English and in Spanish. Participation was open to all individuals in the community aged 18 years or older. All survey responses remained confidential. No identifiable information was collected. Participants were able to skip questions they did not wish to answer.

CARE provided the Design Team with an online link, QR code, and PDF of the survey to print and distribute to their community. The Design Team distributed the survey by sending mailers out to all Ness County residents, hanging flyers at local businesses, putting a flyer in the local newspaper, posting on Facebook, going door-to-door to reach an underrepresented community, attending school events, Ransom October-fest, and the Leisure Years lunch.

The survey opened on September 28th, 2024. CARE provided access to real-time response rates and demographics of de-identified respondents in order to assist the Design Team in tailoring outreach efforts to promote the survey.

About a month and a half after distribution began, survey modifications were made to accommodate requests from the community, to increase accessibility of the survey. The Design Team identified three questions from the existing survey that were 'most important to know from the community.' CARE moved these questions to the beginning of the survey and created an additional, shorter version of the survey condensed to only contain those three questions alongside demographic questions. The full and shortened versions of the survey are available to view in the appendix.

The Design Team requested the data for these three questions be broken down by three groups of ZIP codes categorized according to differences in community contexts. One group includes Beeler and Ness (67518, 67560); another group includes Ransom, Utica, Arnold, & Brownell (67572, 67584, 67515, 67521); and another group includes Bazine (67516). The Design Team noticed several participants entered ZIP codes incorrectly and requested CARE correct them in the analysis. Results reported reflect corrected ZIP codes. Analyses for the three 'most important' questions by ZIP code groups are available to view in the appendix.

The survey closed on December 10th, 2024. Completed paper surveys were mailed to CARE and entered into the online survey platform by CARE for analysis. In total, there were 272 respondents who fully or partially completed the survey. According to the 2023 U.S. Census data, the total number of individuals over 18 years old in Ness County is 2,123. Therefore, the response rate for this survey was about 13% of the eligible population.

Survey Results and Supporting Secondary Data

This section contains analyses for all community survey questions. This section also contains secondary data on the characteristics of the county's population compared to the state of Kansas to provide a more comprehensive look at community health needs.

Since all questions were optional and voluntary, a varying number of individuals responded to each item on the survey so items reported below will vary in frequency of responses. The number of responses received for a question is reported, for example, as (N=210) for the corresponding question.

Demographics

Respondents were asked questions regarding their location, age, gender, race/ethnicity, primary language at home, education, relationship status, income, and employment. Data for sexuality was not collected as requested by the Design Team.

Almost all respondents reside in Ness County and over half reside in the 67560 ZIP code area.

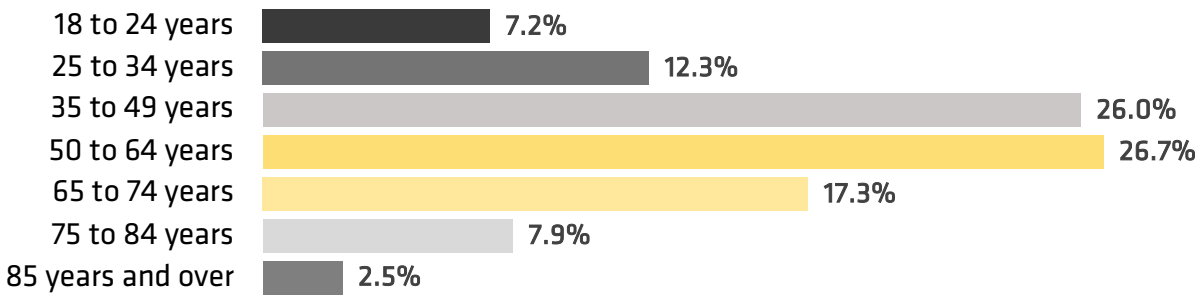

Age and gender demographics for Ness County and Kansas are extremely similar, except for one age category – there is a higher percentage of residents over age 65 in Ness County than in Kansas overall. While 49% of Ness County’s population is male and 51% is female, 21.4% of the survey sample reported their gender as male and 78.2% reported female – meaning females were overrepresented in the survey. About half of the survey sample (52.7%) fall between ages 35-64 and about half are above age 50 (54.4%).

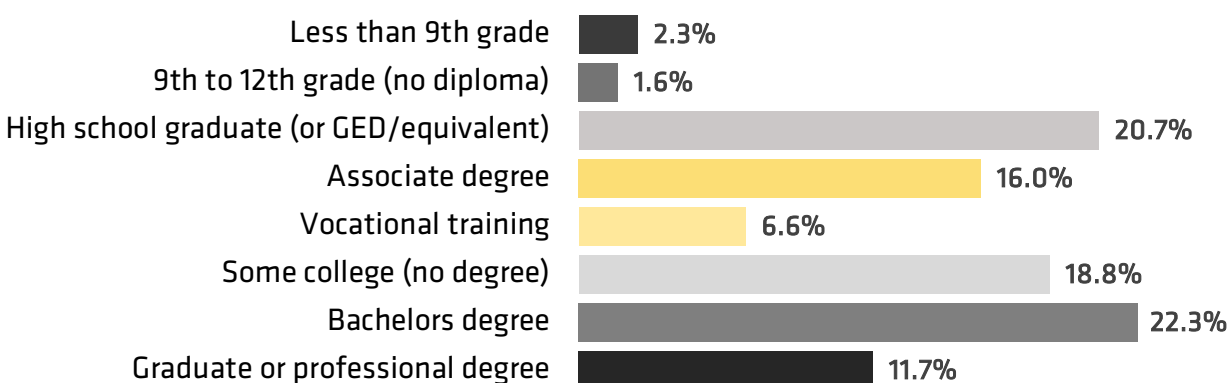

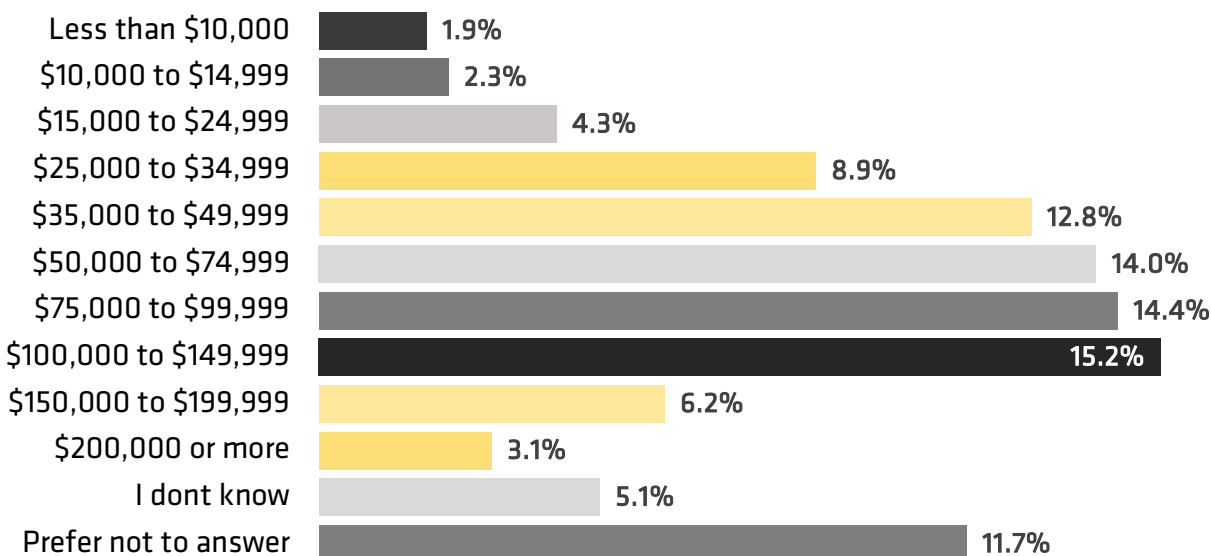
Participants were most frequently married. According to secondary data, the median household income in Ness County is lower than Kansas. Almost a third of survey respondents' household income is less than \$50,000 (30.2%) and more than half of have a household

income of over \$50,000 a year (52.9%). More than a third live in households with incomes over \$75,000 (38.9%) – meaning at least a third of respondents make over the median household income of \$66,107 for Ness County. Almost a quarter over \$100,000 (24.5%).

Ness County has slightly fewer residents with health insurance compared to Kansas overall. The percentage of survey respondents that reported having health insurance coverage for their household is higher (92.5%) than the rate of insured people in Ness County (86.5%). Though, this could possibly be attributed to one data measure being households and the other measure being persons.

Those self-reporting poor or fair health are slightly underrepresented in the survey. While 19.9% of Ness County self-reported poor or fair health status, 16.7% of the survey sample rated their overall health as poor or fair.

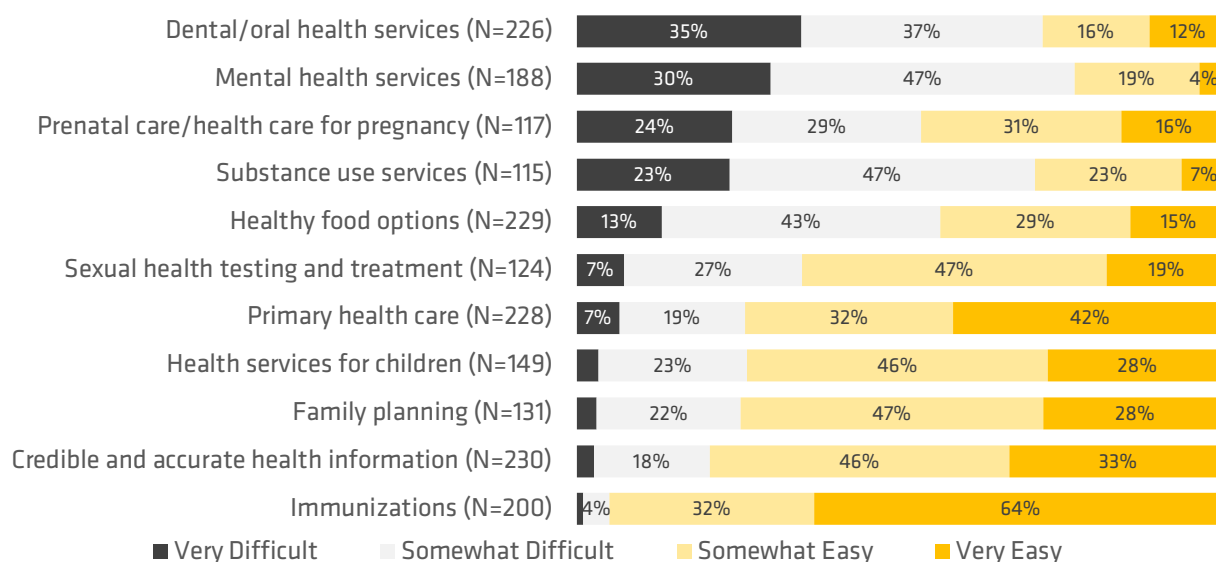

Healthcare Access

Participants indicated dental services were most difficult to access, while immunizations were easiest to access. This is supported by secondary data which indicates a substantially higher ratio of population to dentists for Ness County than the state of Kansas, meaning there are fewer dentists available in Ness County.

Primary healthcare, and credible and accurate health information were reported as easiest to access for participants.

About half of the survey sample identified cost as a barrier to receiving healthcare services (46.8%), which is almost twice as many respondents that identified the following barrier,

location of healthcare services (26%). This indicates cost is a significant barrier for Ness County residents seeking to receive healthcare services.

Other responses include: not being able to have one consistent provider to develop a relationship, build trust with, get accurate diagnosis or treatment; concerns about quality and qualifications of doctors available; confidentiality; treatment of patients by staff; availability of appointments for specialized services; providers not listening and taking time to go over symptoms; and costs still being high despite having insurance.

Internet access is similar for Ness County and Kansas. There are fewer households without a vehicle in Ness County when compared to Kansas. When compared to Kansas overall, Ness County has fewer people over age 65 living below poverty, fewer households living below poverty, and fewer ALICE* households. While Ness County has more households above the ALICE* threshold, there are more children under 18 and under 5 living below poverty than Kansas overall.

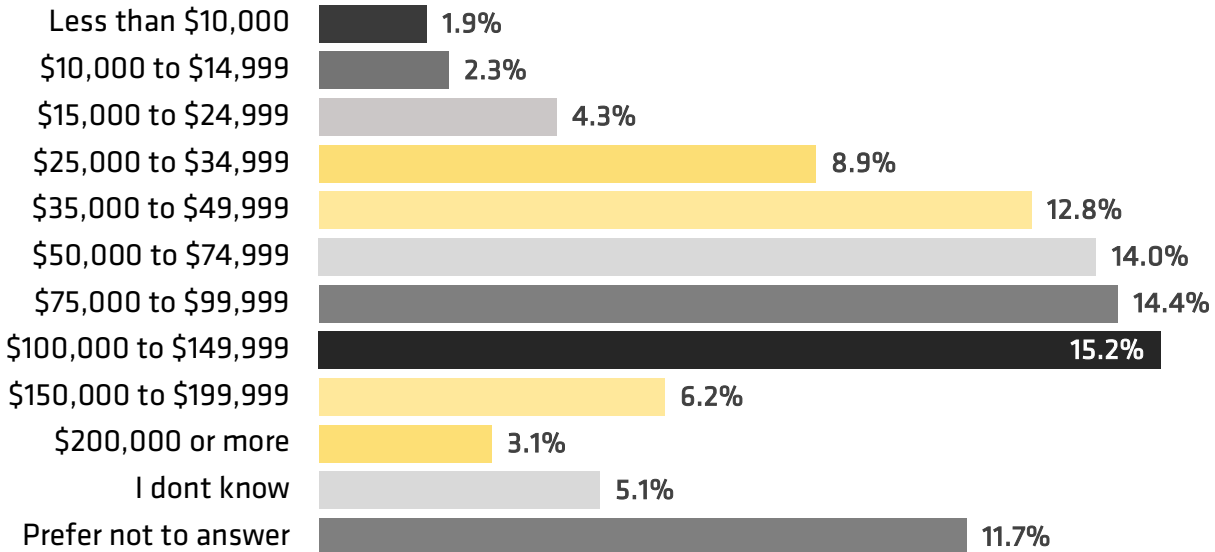

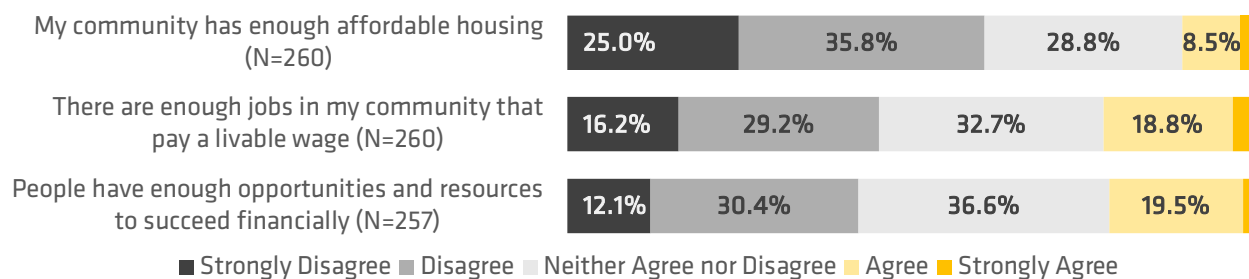

Ness County households living below poverty level are underrepresented in this survey. 4.2% of survey respondents reported an annual household income that falls below the federal poverty level of \$15,650 while there are twice as many Ness County households (8.4%) that live below poverty level.

Survey respondents were asked to rate statements about the quality of life in their community based on their experiences regarding the economy and housing. 45.4% disagreed or strongly disagreed that there are enough jobs in their community that pay a livable wage and 42.5% disagreed or strongly disagreed that people have enough opportunities and resources to succeed financially.



Among survey respondents, 60.8% indicated they disagree or strongly disagree that their community has enough affordable housing. This is supported by other survey data that asked to select three issues of highest concern for housing, in which participants most commonly identified affordable housing as a top concern.

More than half of respondents reported affordable housing as a top concern (52.5%), followed by more than one third that reported a lack of variety of affordable housing options (35.4%), and one third reported assistance with property repair/maintenance (33.5%).

When compared to the state of Kansas, Ness County has significantly lower home values (\$203,400 and \$85,400 respectively). Ness County's median rent is \$653, which is lower than it is for Kansas at \$1,029. There are also significantly fewer renters spending over 30% of their income on rent in Ness County than in Kansas (14.4% vs 43.4%), and fewer people with severe housing problems such as overcrowding, high housing costs, and lack of plumbing (6.3% vs 12.3%). The rate of homeownership is slightly higher in Ness County than in Kansas.

However, while secondary data portrays a better housing landscape for Ness County than Kansas, survey participants still identified housing as a top concern (as seen earlier in this report) and over half reported having high housing costs (52.9%).

A small minority of respondents (2.5%) reported receiving at least one type of assistance for housing.

Homeowners were overrepresented in this survey sample – as 62.5% of Ness County are homeowners while 82.2% of respondents reported owning a home. 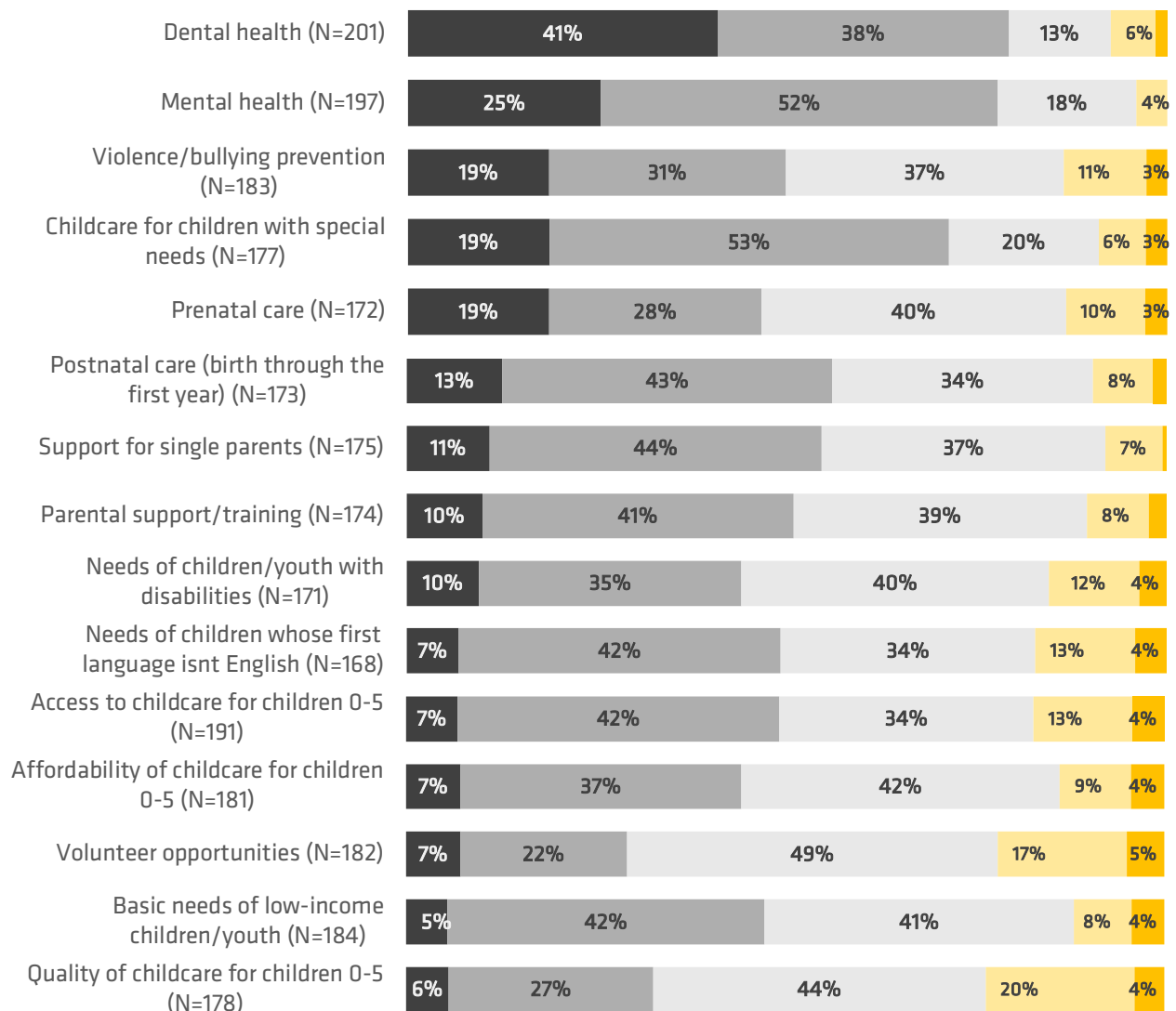

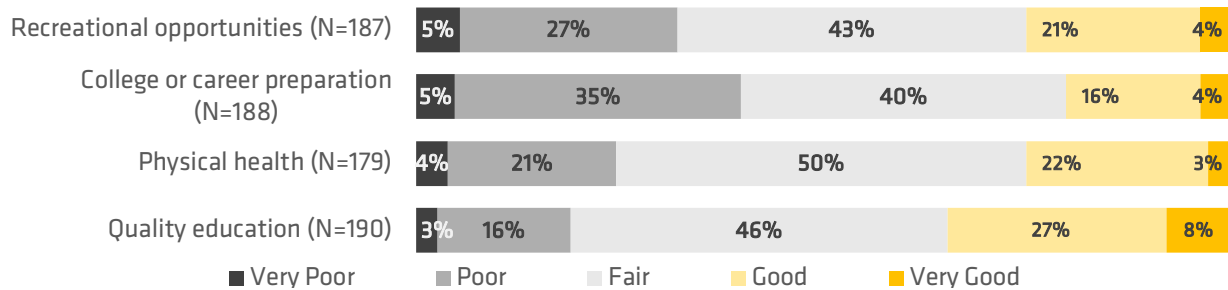

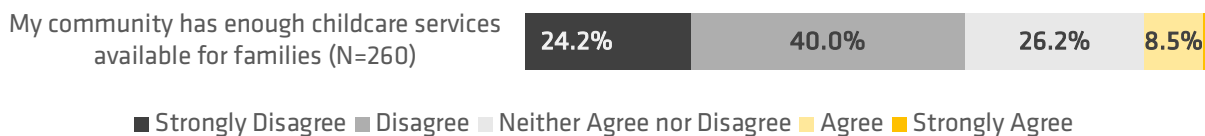

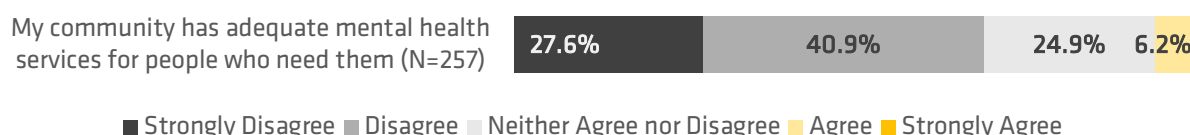

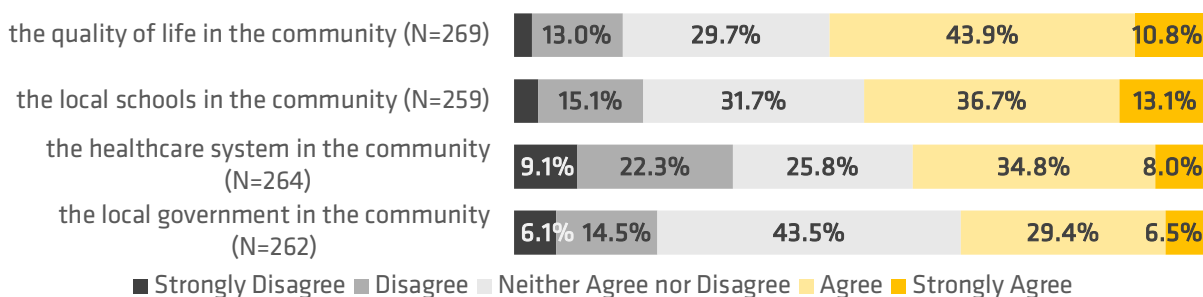

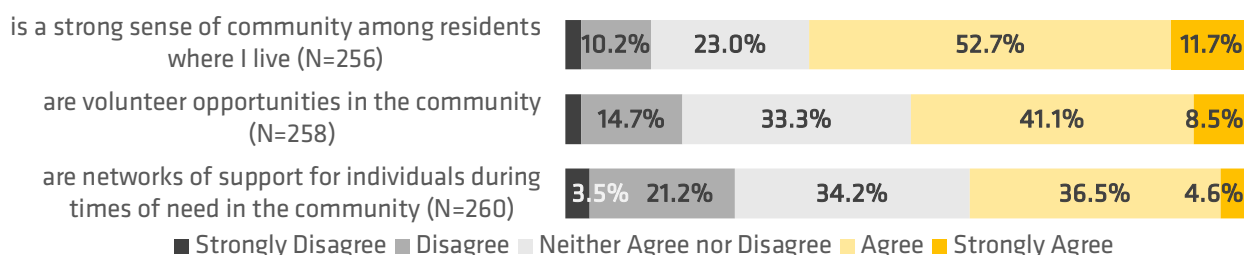

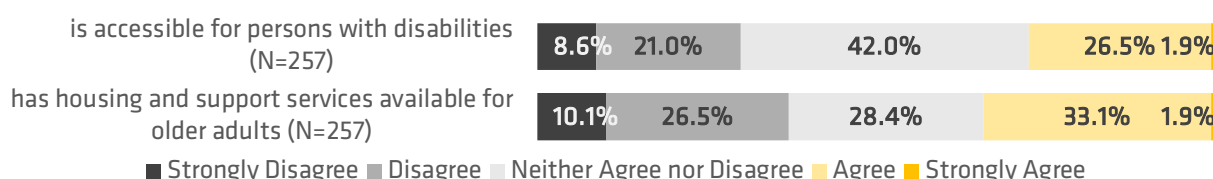

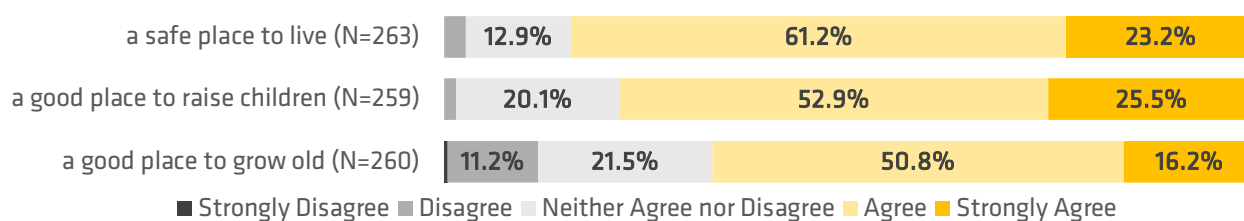

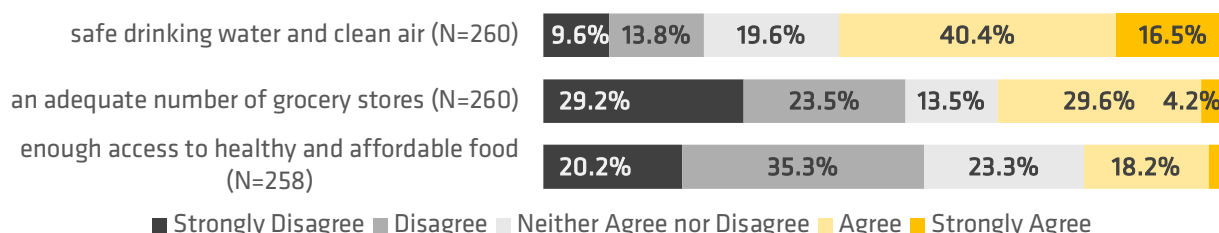

Community Listening Session

Background

The Center of Public Health Initiatives (CPHI) facilitated the community listening and planning sessions. The Ness County Design Team invited members of the Ness County community to participate in a Community Listening Session held on February 16th, 2025 at the Ness County Community Building in Ness City, KS. The session was promoted through email campaigns, social media, local news outlets, word of mouth, and other methods.

The objective of the session was to:

- Gather community feedback on priority health concerns identified through the community survey and secondary data collection.
- Demonstrate transparency and provide an opportunity for community input.
- Collect feedback on possible next steps or resources needed to address community health concerns.

There were 15 community members present, representing both the community and various organizations. The session included a brief, preliminary summary of the CHNA Survey findings followed by a facilitated discussion to gain insights and ideas from participants. Below is a themed summary of the responses gathered during the discussion written CPHI staff facilitators.

Housing-Related Issues

What specific challenges or barriers are people in your community facing?

- Housing that hasn't had a drug influence (rentals as well as owned)
- Availability & Access to Housing
 - Houses that are available are very outdated

- Lack of rental housing
- No affordable rental housing
- Lack of affordable availability
- Lack of available for sale or rent
- No housing available/no apartments/everything is so expensive to rent if available
- Limited affordable housing
